The concepts of size and amount are ones that you use constantly. Whether you search the shelves of a supermarket for the most economical size of a product or you count your change from a dollar bill, you are dealing with matters of quantity, capacity, and proportion. The words in this lesson will help you to express your observations about degrees of smallness and largeness.
