

## HARRY HOUDINI: ESCAPE ARTIST

A warmly dressed crowd watched as a slender man, stripped to bathing trunks and tightly hand-cuffed by police experts, leaped from a bridge into a freezing river through a hole cut in the ice. Two minutes later Harry Houdini emerged, free and smiling, to the cheers of the spectators.

(1) Harry Houdini is recognized as history's leading *exponent* of the art of escape. Born in 1874, he began his career with a circus at the age of nine and continued to give public performances for forty-three years. His physical endurance and remarkable dexterity enabled him to escape from handcuffs and ropes, from jail cells and sealed chests, from vaults buried underground, and from packing cases hurled into the sea.

(2) Many people made the *sup-position* that his escapes were mere trickery. To disprove this, he would often invite people to inspect his equipment. (3) Once they had found that the apparatus had no secret devices, the *opposition* would die down.



Houdini even won a German lawsuit by demonstrating his ability to open locks and safes.

(4) After he had been performing for years, no one could deny the *proposition* that Houdini was the greatest escape artist of the day. (5) Frequently *impostors* from all over the world posed as "The Great Houdini" and tried to imitate his feats. But no one could match Houdini.

(6) Houdini was a composite of the daredevil and the superbly disciplined escape artist. He generated interest in his shows by publicizing them and then by accepting challenges from the audiences that came to see him. Houdini was also a careful student of his art. (7) His mind was a repository of technical information about locks and handcuffs. He trained his body to endure cold, to use a minimum of oxygen in breathing, and to make toes do the work of fingers. (8) He wrote books that pro*pounded* the techniques involved in the art of escape.

(9) Although Houdini's public image was theatrical, his private *disposition* was far from temperamental. (10) Harry Houdini's life reveals an interesting *juxtaposition* of the quiet family man and the flamboyant magician.
